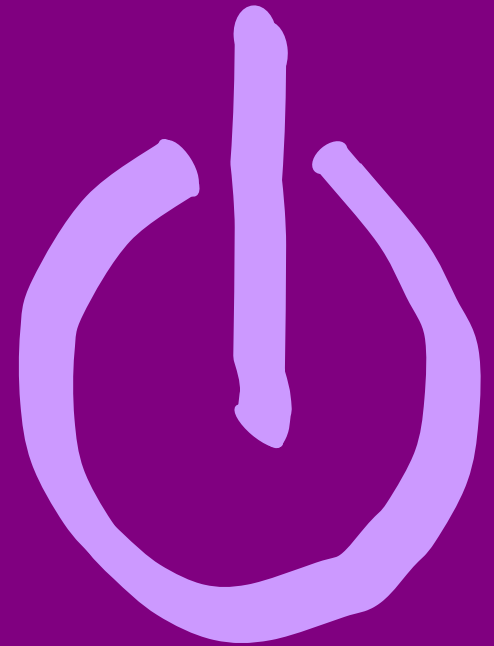

How did we get here?

Victorian Perinatal Data Collection Unit (VPDCU) is authorised to collect information on every birth in Victoria over 20 weeks gestation or more than 400gms birth weight.

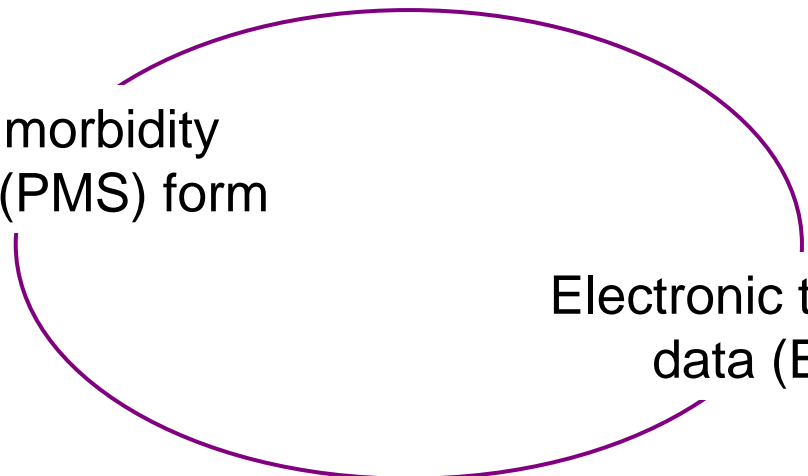
- Review of data elements on PMS form, since 2006
- Electronic capture of data by health service providers
- Electronic storage of data by VPDCU, the current Perinatal Morbidity Statistics System (PMSS), unable to accept the ETOD.

How we work





Role of the HIM within the hospital

- Ensure all Form As and Form Bs are sent to VPDCU. This may involve liaison with the midwifery wards
- Queries – answering them or re-directing them to the appropriate people
- Transfers to tertiary or level 2 hospitals – request for further information will be sought if a mother or baby is transferred for further care at these facilities
- Implement checking procedures to ensure that forms are complete and legible before being sent to VPDCU (manual hospitals)
- Ordering perinatal forms (manual hospitals)
- Sending in TOP forms for birth defects which are less than 20 weeks gestation
- Participating in research or quality activities
- Answering ad hoc questions regarding information on the form that may require investigation into the medical record



A revised perinatal data collection will be implemented as of 1 January 2009.

- transmission process to be tested by April



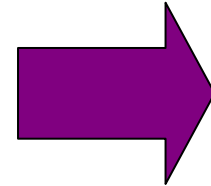
