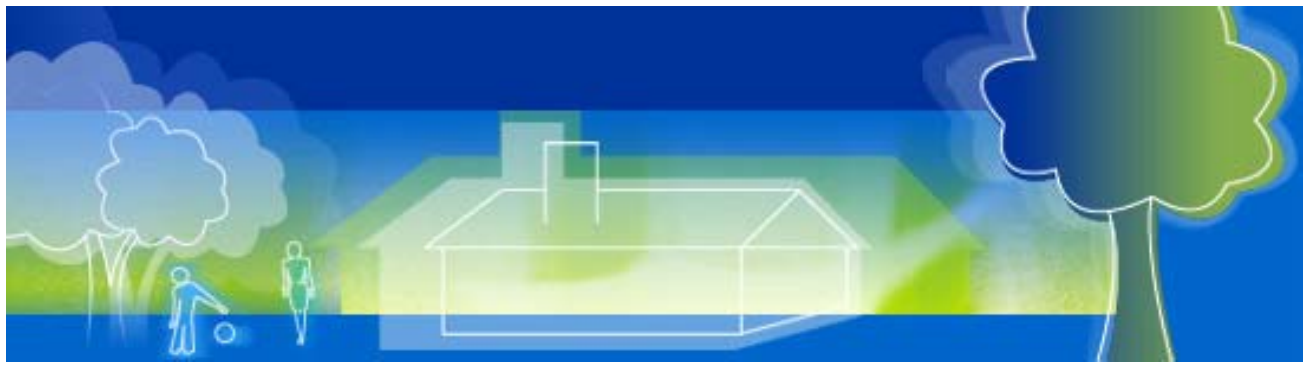

### **Keynote Speaker – Dr Trevor Hancock**

**Dr Trevor Hancock** has been described as one of the best health futurists in the world. He is a public health physician and health promotion consultant who works for local, provincial and national governments, as well as the World Health Organisation. Dr Hancock has been actively involved for 20 years in health promotion, healthy cities/communities, healthy public policy, public health, environmental health, and has consulted with local hospitals and community groups in Canada, the United States, Sweden and elsewhere. Dr Hancock is currently a full time consultant working to develop core programs in public health and a population health promotion approach at the Ministry of Health in Victoria, British Columbia.

##### **Dr Rob Moodie, CEO of the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation (VicHealth)**

Dr Rob Moodie has been CEO of the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation since 1998. He graduated in medicine from the University of Melbourne in 1976 and later trained in Tropical Medicine at Paris University and Public Health at Harvard University. Since 1979 he has worked for Save the Children Fund, and Mediciens San Frontieres in the Sudan; for Congress, the community-controlled Aboriginal Health Service in Alice Springs, and for the World Health Organisation (WHO), the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) and the Joint UN Program on AIDS (UNAIDS) in Uganda, Cameroon and Geneva.

He is Chair of the Premier's Drug Prevention Council, a member of several Boards and Councils including DepressioNet, the Foundation for Young Australians and Ormond College. He is co-editor of three books including *Hands on Health Promotion*. He is married to Anne Christie, a physiotherapist and has two children Nick 20, and Penny 18. He is the Victorian Father of the Year for 2005/2006.

##### **Mr. Peter Boyle, Principal Urban Designer Department of Sustainability & Environment**

Peter is Principal Urban Designer with the Victorian Government's Department of Sustainability and Environment. He has studied and worked in Australia and internationally in urban design and landscape architecture. He is responsible for providing high-level advocacy and advice to state and local governments and the private sector in relation to urban design matters. Emphasising the importance of inclusive public environments his work is directed towards making healthy human habitats that provide current and future choices for as wide a range of users as possible.

##### **Mr. Peter Brown, CEO Parks and People Foundation**

Peter Brown is the inaugural CEO of The People and Parks Foundation. The Foundation is a not-for-profit charitable organisation whose purpose is to connect people to the natural environment in order to improve human health and wellbeing, and build a stronger relevance of parks in people's lives. The Mission of the Foundation is "To improve the health and wellbeing of people and the sustainability of parks by expanding the quality, quantity and range of people and parks interactions across Australia and internationally."

Peter has been the General Manager of the Lort Smith Animal Hospital, a not-for-profit animal welfare charity that provides quality animal care to people of limited financial means. Prior to taking up the position at Lort Smith Animal Hospital, he was Lecturer in Wildlife and Park Management at Deakin University for sixteen years. He retains an honorary research associate position at Deakin University, and is now working with colleagues in the Faculty of Health and Behavioral Sciences on a number of projects investigating the health and social capital benefits of people interacting with Nature (particularly in a parks context). Peter is a Fellow of the Williamson Community Leadership Program (Leadership Victoria), a Member of the World Commission on Protected Areas (WCPA), Chair of the Committee of Chairs of Animal Ethics Committees (DPI), a member of several Boards including Animal Management in Rural and Regional Indigenous Communities, the Gould League of Victoria, and the Gould Group.
