Are you thinking of using a pest control service?

Community factsheet

Sometimes you might have pest problems that will be too difficult to manage yourself. For these jobs, you should hire a licensed pest control operator who holds a **pest control licence**.

Who holds a pest control licence?

Anyone who uses pesticides in the course of a pest control business in Victoria is required to hold a licence under the *Public Health and Wellbeing Act* 2008. The licence is issued by the Department of Health and Human Services to people who have attained an appropriate qualification. The qualification includes training in the safe handling, storage and application of pesticides, and the identification and management of pests.

The Victorian **pest control licence** is a photo ID similar to the example below:



The Victorian **pest control licence** authorises the person to use certain types of pesticides. The arrow below indicates an authorisation on a licence.

The person named on this card is licensed under section 101 of the *Public Health and Wellbeing Act* 2008 to use the following pesticides.

Pesticides (excluding fuming to ,) mutualed for the control of arthropods, nd) to birds and fungi, which are used to control unsum, ther than pest animals).

This licence is valid until 20/03/2010, unless suspended or revoked in accordance with the provisions of the Act or the Regulations thereunder.

How do I know if a person with a pest control licence can deal with *my* pest problem?

A person who holds a **pest control licence** can have up to three different authorisations listed on their licence. You should check the licence to see if they have the appropriate authorisation for your job. The three authorisations are:

Pesticides (excluding fumigants) formulated for the control of arthropods, rodents, birds and fungi, which are used to control pests (other than pest animals)

For pests such as spiders, cockroaches, termites, ants, house mice, roof or black rats, common or Norway rats, fleas, mites, silverfish, flies, wasps, mosquitoes, bed bugs, beetles, bees and introduced birds.

• Pesticides formulated for the control of pest animals

For pests such as rabbits and foxes in and around domestic and commercial buildings in urban areas.

• Pesticides in the form of fumigants

Primarily for specialised pest control, such as fumigation of furniture, machinery and clothing for guarantine purposes.





Why should I hire a person who holds a pest control licence?

It is illegal for a person in a pest control business to apply pesticides without a licence.

A person with a **pest control licence** should:

- · Identify the pest and its habitat
- · Determine an appropriate pest management plan
- · Apply, handle and store pesticides safely
- Provide information and advice about the pesticides they use
- Answer your questions.

Checklist for selecting a pest control service

You should:

- Obtain several quotes for the job
- Talk to neighbours or friends who might be able to recommend services
- Check that the person who will be applying the pesticides hold a valid Victorian pest control licence
- · Check the authorisation on their licence
- If unsure, verify the operator's details with the Department of Health and Human Services by calling 1300 767 469 or online via http://122.252.13.117/environment/pest_licences.as p.
- Check that the pest control operator has sufficient insurance
- Ask questions.
- PLEASE NOTE: The Department of Health and Human Services licenses pest control operators, therefore is unable to provide recommendations for particular pest control companies or operators.
